West Marin Fund grants for youth involvement in nonprofits

The West Marin Fund (WMF), a foundation organized to serve the communities of coastal West Marin, has announced its second round of grants. The awards go to twenty nonprofit organizations and total nearly \$50,000. The grants support projects that involve local youth in the work of nonprofits—from internships and youth-oriented services to opportunities for young people to become community citizens and philanthropists. Grants ranged from \$750 to \$5,000.

"The West Marin Fund hopes that these grants will teach young people about the critical role nonprofits play in serving the communities we live in," said Board Chair Harriet Moss. "We want to give them the opportunity to work with a local nonprofit and feel the satisfaction of providing needed community services. The proposals we received represented a great diversity of approaches to youth involvement, and we expect they'll all help to develop young leaders and future nonprofit board members."

Among the grantees are:

- West Marin Community Radio station KWMR, which was awarded a \$4,000 grant for a DJ project to train youth in professional communications and public engagement.
- Bolinas Community Land Trust, which was awarded a \$2,000 grant for a fundraising apprentice program, training youth about both community service and fundraising for nonprofits.
- Turtle Island Restoration Network, which won a \$1,500 grant toward coordinating a student scientist / intern program

Bolinas photographer wins Pirkle Jones grant

The Pirkle Jones Foundation, established by the late Mill Valley photographer Pirkle Jones, has named Bolinas resident El Geller as the third recipient of a grant from its Visual Artists Support Program. The program supports promising emerging and mid-career artists living in Marin County Photographer Geller will receive a grant of \$25,000.

The PJF Visual Arts Support Program grant aims to recognize, encourage, and nurture artistic imagination and drive, commitment to the creative process, aesthetic standards, and artistic potential.

Upon notification of the grant, Geller

wrote, "I am completely amazed and filled with gratitude by this opportunity. This is a monumental affirmation as an artist. I am looking forward to a wonderful year as a photographer, and to cultivating and expanding my universe in art and life."

After a 2013 sold out show at the Gospel Flat Farm Gallery in Bolinas, Eli made the decision to pursue photography full time. He was inspired to be an artist after watching a film about the life and work of Ansel Adams. This led to his discovery of and dedication to the alternative photographic process called "lith printing". He notes. "The process allows me to express the numinous, mysterious beauty that I see I am especially moved by the raw, untouched natural world. Every 'lith print' is one of a kind, through them I am constantly reminded of the tremendous beauty that surrounds and enfolds us, and that Nature is the greatest artist of all."
