In support of these community services, West Marin Fund is **making grants**, **making changes**, and **making a difference**.

MAKING GRANTS



The West Marin Fund recently awarded \$63,000 in grants towards "Keeping Communities Strong" – our ninth round of small grants in the past five years. We received the greatest number of proposals thus far, and were pleased to award grants to 32 organizations serving the diverse needs of coastal West Marin.

Our small grants are supporting many worthwhile efforts: camp scholarships in Bolinas, Stinson Beach and Point Reyes Station; volunteer and intern trainings at

Halleck Creek Ranch, Turtle Island Restoration
Network and the Bolinas Community Center;
technology upgrades and innovations to KWMR, the
Dance Palace Community Center, and the West
Marin Review; innovative collaborations between
partner organizations such as the Tomales Bay Youth
Center and the Bolinas Stinson Youth Group; and
numerous other small yet significant efforts that will
strengthen West Marin nonprofits and the
communities they serve.





Through our <u>small grants program</u>, West Marin Fund has awarded **over \$500,000 to more than 60 nonprofit organizations** in our coastal region – all made possible by generous gifts from local donors like you.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

You may find it hard to know about the challenges that face children and youth in our communities. Without regular public transport, they may not be able to attend after-school programs. With diminishing class sizes, they have limited opportunities for socializing. For homes that lack internet access, they may have difficulty getting their homework done. Every community is stronger when families are confident their children will thrive.

Thankfully there are many nonprofit organizations working – and working together – to help West Marin youth get the support that their more urban peers take for granted "over the hill". This includes West Marin's preschools, our community and teen centers, as well as scholarship and mentoring programs, summer camps and science internships – all these warrant our enthusiastic support. In the last three months, West Marin Fund has awarded \$29,500 to 15 nonprofits working with youth.

Giving Through Youth

This spring, our <u>youth philanthropy program</u> was once again heartwarming and significant. Students in three classrooms spanning grades 3-8 met with local nonprofit leaders, learned about their work, and made the case for funding organizations of their choice. As a result, \$9,000 was awarded to 14 organizations for specific activities benefiting local communities. Congratulations to the teachers, nonprofits, and students for their thoughtful and compelling work.
